# October 2011 Greetings!

On behalf of the Society, we would like to invite you to the 2012 Biennial Scientific Meeting of the American Society for Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology. We will be meeting Wednesday through Saturday, March 14–17, 2012, at the Hyatt Regency San Francisco, in San Francisco, California.

This year, the Biennial will be preceded by a full day of optional postgraduate courses. These are designed to provide an in-depth review of a wide variety of topics and include:

- Loop Electrosurgical Excision Procedure (LEEP) Course (with a hands-on practicum)
- Vulvovaginal Disease Course (including an optional hands-on Vulvar Suturing and Reconstructive Techniques workshop)
- Special Populations' Course reviewing the screening and management of adolescents, pregnant women, postmenopausal women, immunocompromised patients, and screening for anal disease in both women and men
- Advanced Colposcopy: Implementing the Guidelines through Case-Based Images

The Biennial will then be kicked-off on Wednesday evening with a Welcome Reception in the beautiful atrium of the Hyatt Regency San Francisco. The following three days of the 2012 Biennial promise to ensure that you are up-to-date on the latest advances in lower genital tract disease management while alerting you to coming changes in our discipline. We will once again offer the very popular "Lunch with the Professor" sessions, afternoon symposia featuring the latest scientific developments, and concurrent sessions including case-based studies and presentations of abstracts from ground-breaking research in lower genital tract disease (abstracts are due on October 28).

- The ASCCP Challenge Bowl

# Is this meeting right for me?

The ASCCP 2012 Biennial Meeting is targeted to all who are interested in improving clinical outcomes in the prevention and management of lower genital tract disease. This includes healthcare providers from a variety of different disciplines including gynecologists, family physicians, gynecologic oncologists, pathologists, dermatologists who deal with vulvar conditions, advanced practice clinicians (e.g., nurse practitioners, physician's assistants, nurse midwives, etc.), epidemiologists, laboratory scientists, and residency directors and residents in obstetrics/gynecology, family medicine, and pathology.

## Meeting Competencies & Objectives

This scientific meeting reflects the current status of clinical knowledge in lower genital tract diagnosis and treatment, including the *Consensus Guidelines for the Management of Women with Abnormal Cervical Cancer Screening Tests* and the *Management of Women with Cervical Intraepithelial Neoplasia or Adenocarcinoma In-situ*. It is designed to improve medical knowledge, practice-based learning, patient outcomes, and/or systems-based practice. Specific goals are set for the learner to obtain upon completion of the meeting and it is expected the learner will be able to:

- Discuss cervical cancer and its precursor lesions including the epidemiology and natural history, screening methods, management and the causal role of HPV;
- Discuss HPV including the biology, epidemiology, natural history, and immune response of HPV, as well as understand the costs to society and to the individual of HPV infections;
- Define the usefulness and limitations of colposcopy in the management of lower genital tract disease;
- Tailor guidelines for cervical disease screening and management of cervical abnormalities to women in both the general population and in special circumstances using evidence derived from epidemiology and natural history studies;
- Manage women with lower genital tract disease from special populations, especially adolescent, postmenopausal, and underserved women, with insight into special problems encountered including HPV-related anal disease;
- Apply HPV DNA testing and relevant diagnostic tests to clinical practice in a directed, evidence-based, and cost-effective manner;
- Define and be able to discuss with colleagues and patients the efficacy, benefits, risks, and cost-effectiveness of the HPV vaccines and identify those patients most likely to benefit from HPV vaccination;
- Integrate into practice new insights from the latest research on diagnosis and management of lower genital tract disease; and,
- Describe and appropriately apply treatment options for lower genital tract disease to include cervical, vaginal, vulvar, and anal intraepithelial neoplasia, genital warts, and other vulvar and vaginal diseases.



# Meeting Education Methods

**Lectures:** Each day, the learners will attend general plenary sessions related to their areas of interest. Each session will conclude with a question and answer period led by the presenter(s) to reinforce core concepts. Throughout the lectures and question and answer periods, faculty members utilize an Audience Response System. The faculty uses these group responses to readdress items not answered correctly by the target goal percentage. This immediate feedback helps course attendees identify their own weaknesses and allows them to follow up with the faculty onsite. For the Saturday “Your Diagnosis Is?” session, faculty present unusual cases for group diagnosis and management votes, review of correct answers, and open discussion.

**Clinical Abstracts:** The learners will have the ability to present and hear abstracts of clinical research results, utilizing both oral presentation and poster formats.

**Panel Discussions:** For selected topics, learners will direct questions to panels of experts on how to integrate reported advances into their practices. Experts will present their varying evidence-based perspectives so that learners can determine what may be best practice in their setting.

**Debates:** A series of debates will be presented on topics currently under discussion within the field and timely to the management of disease of the lower genital tract. Faculty will represent the pros and cons of the specific practice or issue thus revealing the many facets necessary to evaluate and manage the clinical challenge under debate.

## One-day Postgraduate Pre-courses

*Advanced Colposcopy: Implementing the Guidelines through Case-Based Images* — With the development of the ASCCP Consensus Guidelines for the Management of Women with Abnormal Cervical Cancer Screening Tests and Management of CIN/AIS, ASCCP and its conference co-sponsors established broad concepts governing the management process for preventing cervical cancer. Broad recommendations, however, can be difficult to apply to specific clinical situations, so this workshop has been developed to provide healthcare clinicians with a working understanding of the science underlying the recommendations, as well as the ability to best utilize these guidelines in the interest of patients. This session provides the learners with opportunities to apply the management guidelines in various clinical scenarios with iteration of the underlying clinical and basic science to specific cases and patient populations.

*Advanced Colposcopy and Special Populations* — This session will provide additional in-depth discussion of special populations including adolescents, pregnant and postmenopausal women, immunocompromised patients, and challenging topics. Working with adolescents and young women can be challenging both colposcopically and behaviorally. This age group has the highest rates of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and understanding colposcopic impressions of STIs is critical in caring for them. This workshop will cover colposcopic challenges, discuss confidentiality and electronic health care systems, and STI diagnosis and treatment updates. Both pregnancy and menopause affect the appearance of the cervix. This workshop will cover guidelines for screening, diagnosis and treatment in these populations. Last, anal cancers are highest in immunosuppressed women and in women with other HPV-associated disease, specifically vulvar and cervical disease. This session will provide the data regarding anal cancer screening in high risk women and the approach to diagnosis.



#### *Loop Electrosurgical Excision Procedure (LEEP)* —

This course is designed primarily for advanced practice clinicians, residents, and family physicians intermediate to advanced in their level of medical knowledge and colposcopic assessment of the cervix who are interested in adding LEEP treatment to their skill sets. In particular, it is geared towards clinicians with an adequate patient volume who can be treated with LEEP. The objectives for this session are to: understand the electrosurgical principles, process, equipment and supplies of the procedure; appropriately assess candidates for LEEP; understand and be able to communicate the potential complications, both immediate and delayed, and how to manage them; and, develop informed consent to accurately communicate the risks and benefits of the treatment. Limited enrollment

*Vulvovaginal Disease* — The Vulvovaginal Disease course is for all clinicians dealing with colposcopy or women's health. Although vaginal and vulvar complaints are common, many clinicians feel underprepared to deal with these issues. This one-day workshop will cover many aspects involving the diagnosis and treatment of these diseases. The morning session will focus on problems including: vaginal intraepithelial neoplasia, caring for patients with recurrent vaginitis, vulvar intraepithelial neoplasia, vulvodynia, ulcer-related diseases, and the three lichens: sclerosus, simplex chronicus, planus. Following the morning half of the program, there are two afternoon sessions from which the participants may choose. The first option is a vulvar suturing and reconstruction workshop that covers advanced suturing techniques and basic flaps and plasties that can be used to facilitate vulvar surgery. The second option will offer additional didactics on hidradenitis suppurativa, vulvar fissures, complicated vaginitis cases, pediatric vulvovaginal conditions, and methicillin-resistant staphylococcus aureus infections. A special emphasis on diagnosis and treatment of the various conditions will be used.

## Symposia

Two afternoon symposia will present the latest advances and in-depth information on the issues of HPV immunology and molecular diagnostics, updates on the HPV vaccines, and the future of cervical cancer prevention. The symposia will run via lectures and panel discussions, with the audience response system allowing for greater interaction between learners and faculty. Advance questions from the ASCCP membership at large as well as onsite questions from learners will be sought.

*Cervical Cancer Screening and Prevention: The Role of Molecular Testing* — This symposium will review available evidence by which future recommendations will be made regarding the incorporation of molecular testing into cervical cancer screening. The focus will be on optimal screening intervals, screening strategies for women 30 and over, management of HPV-positive / cytology-negative women, if and when women should be exited from screening, the impact of HPV vaccination, and the potential impact of molecular screening. The course objective is to prepare clinicians for potential changes in future screening and management guidelines.

*Symposium: Update on the HPV Vaccines* — This symposium provides a series of “state of the science” discussions on new data emerging from recent HPV vaccination trials. Key topics will include health care policy models predicting the impact of various vaccination strategies, the impact of vaccination in males and immunocompromised individuals, and the status of HPV vaccination globally. The symposium objective is to improve clinicians’ understanding of the potential impact of widespread vaccination of different target populations against HPV.

## Concurrent Afternoon Sessions

*Scientific Session (Abstract Presentations)* This special session will provide clinicians with the opportunity to hear brief presentations from ground breaking research in lower genital tract disease, including HPV infection and cervical, vaginal, and vulvar disease. Topics include epidemiology, natural history, prevention, screening, management, and adherence to guidelines.

*Clinical Colposcopy: Challenging Issues in the Management of Women with Cervical Disease and Colposcopy Pattern Recognition, Clinical Pearls and More (Clinical Sessions)* These two back to back sessions will utilize cervical images and case presentations to provide clinicians the opportunity to improve their skills in diagnosing and managing cervical abnormalities. They have been developed and are intended for the spectrum of colposcopic skill levels from the novice to the experienced colposcopist. Learners will practice assessing for adequacy of exam, presence or absence of disease and selecting biopsy sites. Course objectives are how to approach the management of women who fall through the cracks of the guidelines, to sharpen colposcopic pattern recognition skills, to improve exam adequacy and biopsy site selection skills, and to discuss an approach to counseling women about HPV in a way that focuses on cervical disease and not the STD aspect of the disease.

## Lunch with the Professor Sessions

This is your opportunity to have lunch with and ask your difficult questions of one of the distinguished leaders in the field of lower genital tract health! Each lunch session lasts one hour and is available for one additional CME credit hour. Lunch will be provided. Participants must register using the general meeting registration form.

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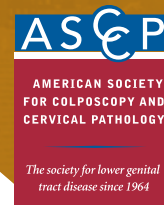

The ASCCP is inviting submissions of abstracts for presentation at the 2012 Biennial Scientific Meeting. Submissions will be accepted on-line from July 1, 2011 through October 28, 2011 using the form and instructions posted at [www.ConferenceAbstracts.com/ASCCP.htm](http://www.ConferenceAbstracts.com/ASCCP.htm).

Abstracts are juried by the ASCCP Program Committee under the direction of Warner K. Huh, MD, Andrew W. Menzin, MD, Michael A. Gold, MD and Richard S. Guido, MD. **All abstract submissions and required supporting documents must be posted at [www.ConferenceAbstracts.com/ASCCP.htm](http://www.ConferenceAbstracts.com/ASCCP.htm) on or before midnight, Eastern time, on Friday, October 28, 2011.**

**Only abstracts or posters by non-industry authors will be considered for presentation.**

All accepted abstracts will be published in a supplement to the March 2012 *Journal of Lower Genital Tract Disease (JLGTD)* and available at the 2012 Biennial Scientific Meeting.

Manuscript submission is **not** required for abstract presentation, however, to be considered for all but one of the oral abstract prizes (cash award plus a plaque, as further described below), you must also submit a complete manuscript for publication in the Society's *Journal of Lower Genital Tract Disease (JLGTD)*. The complete manuscript must conform to the instructions for authors as required by the *JLGTD* and can be found at: <http://journals.lww.com/jlgt/>

**Manuscripts are due to the JLGTD no later than Feb. 29, 2012.**

**ASCCP ABSTRACT AWARDS** – will be announced during the ASCCP 2012 Biennial Meeting.

The following award does **not** require a manuscript and the prize includes an engraved wall plaque and recognition in the *JLGTD*.

### **BEST SCIENTIFIC PAPER AWARD**

The Best Scientific Paper Award is presented to the best overall scientific paper (without a manuscript) in lower genital tract disease.

The following awards all require submission of a manuscript and include an engraved wall plaque, a cash award, and recognition in the *JLGTD*.

### **BEST SCIENTIFIC PAPER AWARD (\$1000)**

The Best Scientific Paper Award is presented to the best overall scientific paper in lower genital tract disease.

### **BEST OVERALL RESIDENT or FELLOW PRIZE PAPER (\$500 plus free registration for the lead resident/fellow presenter)**

The Best Overall Resident/Fellow Prize Paper is awarded for the best scientific abstract prepared and presented by a resident or fellow.

### **THE GEORGE C. TROMBETTA, MD TEACHING AWARD (\$1000)**

The George C. Trombetta, MD Teaching Award is presented to the best scientific teaching abstract in lower genital tract disease.

### **THE THOMAS V. SEDLACEK, MD PRIZE FOR BEST CLINICAL RESEARCH PAPER (\$1000)**

The Thomas V. Sedlacek, MD Prize for Best Clinical Research Paper is presented for the best scientific abstract on a clinical care issue in lower genital tract disease.

### **THE ASCCP/HOLOGIC YOUNG INVESTIGATOR'S AWARD (\$500)**

The ASCCP/Hologic Young Investigator's Award is presented to the best resident or fellow cervical screening paper.

### **ASCCP BEST POSTER AWARDS (2 Awards, \$250 each)**

The ASCCP Executive Committee awards prizes for the two best posters. Manuscripts are not required for a poster award.

# INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

## Abstract Deadline: October 28, 2011.

All abstracts and required supporting documents must be submitted electronically by midnight ET.

## Guidelines and Basic Format:

1. Submit in English language only.
2. Title in bold CAPITAL LETTERS: Use significant words descriptive of subject content.
3. Select the topic area that best describes the subject of the abstract.
4. The proposed presenting author must be indicated in **bold**.
5. Provide source(s) of financial support and disclaimers (when needed). Any and all industry support must be mentioned on one line at the end of the abstract. **NOTE:** Only abstracts by non-industry authors can be considered for oral presentations or awards.
6. Use standard abbreviations and all abbreviations should be spelled out at first use.
7. Provide Objective, Methods, Results, and Conclusions in bold capital letters and left-justified. Literature searches and case reports are not accepted.
8. Drugs and instruments must be referred to by their generic name **ONLY**. When needed to specify the source of the product, the manufacturer's name, city and state must be placed in brackets [ ] after the generic name at first use. Registered and Trademark symbols are not to be used.
9. Key words should be included and consist of 3 to 5 words or terms for indexing. Terms from the medical subject headings of Index Medicus should be used. For standard terms, please refer to <http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/PubMed>.
10. Information identifying the authors or study center(s) should be deleted from the body of the abstract to ensure blinded copy presentation to judges.
11. Your abstract should be informative and must contain (a) the study's specific objectives or the hypothesis of the study; (b) a brief statement of methods used (to include means for problem solving, number and relevant characteristics of subjects, and statistical analysis); (c) a summary of the results obtained; and, (d) a statement of the conclusions. Use short specific titles. It is not satisfactory to state, "The results will be discussed."
12. When using abbreviations for compounds, spell out in full in the first mention, followed by the abbreviation in parentheses. Do not abbreviate compounds in the title of the abstract. Use of unfamiliar abbreviations may be grounds for rejection unless definitions are supplied in the abstract.
13. Disclosure of Interest form must be completed individually by **all** authors to reflect any conflicts and submitted online with the abstract. Additionally, the JLGTD submission form, allowing any accepted abstract to be published in the special JLGTD supplement, must be completed. **Abstracts will not be forwarded to the Abstract Committee for consideration, unless a Disclosure of Conflict of Interest form for each of the authors listed on the abstract is completed. All required forms are available online.**

## Cash Awards:

Manuscript submission is not required for abstract presentation, however, to be considered for all but one of the oral abstract cash awards, you must submit a complete manuscript for publication in the Society's *Journal of Lower Genital Tract Disease* no later than February 29, 2012.

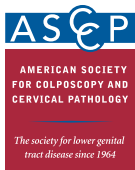
