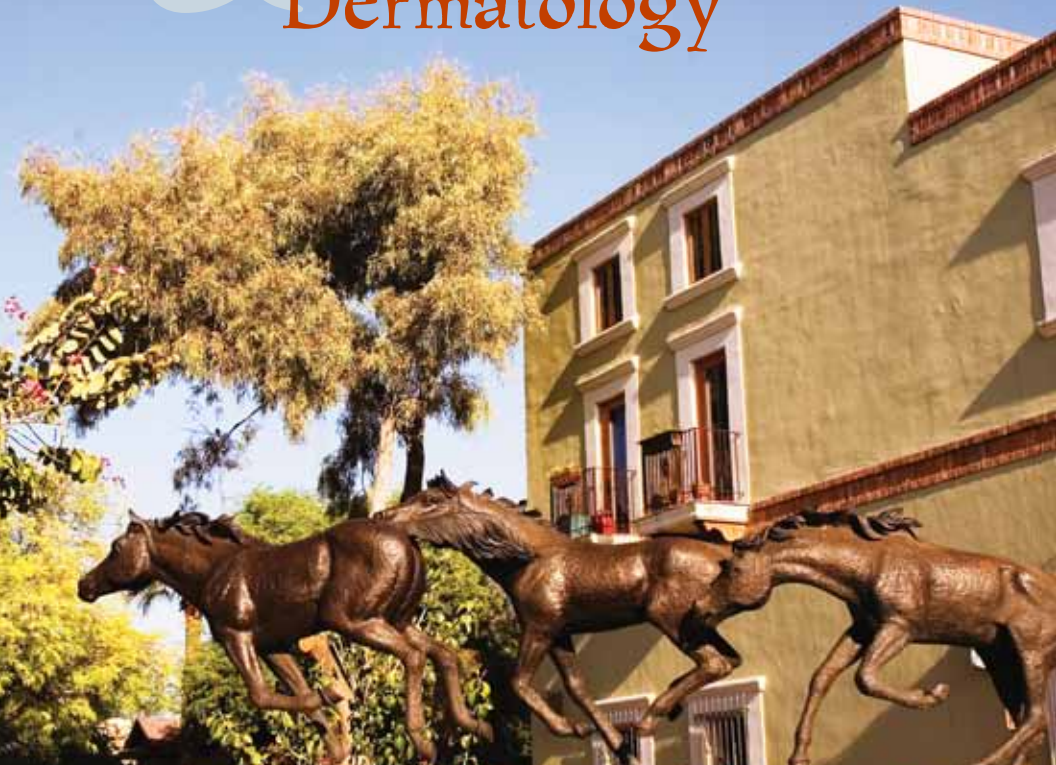

# Is This Course Right For Me?

This ASCCP postgraduate course best serves those licensed physicians and advanced practice clinicians who are intermediate to advanced in their level of the knowledge and treatment of vulvar, vaginal, and cervical diseases. It is designed for those clinicians who treat patients with persistent or recurrent vulvovaginal conditions such as recurrent candidiasis, lichen sclerosus, introital dyspareunia, recurrent human papillomavirus (HPV) or herpes virus lesions, as well as those who manage women with VIN or recurrent Pap abnormalities. This course reflects the current status of clinical knowledge in lower genital tract diagnoses and treatment, including the recent *Consensus Guidelines for the Management of Women with Abnormal Cervical Cancer Screening Tests* and the *Management of Women with Cervical Intraepithelial Neoplasia or Adenocarcinoma In-situ*. This course also addresses HPV research, management and education including the FDA-approved HPV vaccines. It is designed to improve competencies in medical knowledge, practice-based learning, patient care, and systems-based practice.

## Course Competencies & Objectives

- Outline the biology, epidemiology and natural history of HPV and how it relates to screening, triage and treatment of preinvasive and invasive neoplasia of the lower genital tract (*medical knowledge*);
- Recognize and manage benign conditions of the cervix, vagina, and vulva to include ulcers, Crohn's, hidradenitis suppurativa, etc. (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning*);
- Recognize and treat non-neoplastic epithelial conditions of the vulva to include lichen sclerosus, lichen simplex chronicus, and lichen planus (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning*);
- Diagnose and formulate a care plan for infection-related conditions of the lower female genital tract including recurrent candidiasis, bacterial vaginosis, trichomoniasis, desquamative inflammatory vaginitis, and external genital warts (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning*);
- Summarize new terminology categories for vulvar pain and describe current diagnostic and treatment strategies (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning*);
- Define the new terminology of vulvar intraepithelial neoplasia (VIN) and diagnose and determine the most effective treatments for VIN and vaginal intraepithelial neoplasia (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning*);
- Outline the diagnostic procedures used in evaluating for cervical neoplasia and describe appropriate management options of CIN of various grades (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning*);
- Assess practice populations to identify special populations—adolescents, mid-reproductive age, postmenopausal, and immunocompromised women—at risk for various vulvovaginal and cervical diseases (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning, systems-based practice*);

- Describe and employ the ASCCP consensus guidelines on the management of women with abnormal cervical cancer screening tests and CIN/AIS (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning*);
- Analyze practice populations to identify patients who meet criteria for receiving a HPV vaccine series and those women for whom the vaccine may be contraindicated or unlikely to provide benefit and communicate with patients, their families, colleagues, and the public about the benefits, risks, and indications for HPV vaccination, including cost effectiveness and the downstream societal impacts of adequate vaccine uptake (*medical knowledge, patient care, practice-based learning, systems-based practice, and interpersonal communications*).

## Course Educational Methods

**Lectures:** Each day, the learners attend general sessions designed around the course curriculum. Ample question and answer periods led by the presenter(s) are scheduled throughout the sessions to allow for increased participation and clarification of issues. The audience response system will be used to give learners immediate feedback on key teaching points.

**Panel Discussions:** For selected topics, learners will direct questions to panels of experts on how to integrate reported advances into their practices. The faculty will present their evidence-based perspectives so that learners can determine what may be best practice in their clinical settings.

**Interactive Case Study Sessions:** Several interactive sessions will be used throughout the course to test medical knowledge and practice-based learning skills on various vulvar, vaginal, and cervical conditions. Participants, in conjunction with faculty leadership, will review cases, vote on their diagnosis and discuss what management and treatment course they would pursue and why.

## Optional CME Workshop

### **Skin Surgery Techniques and Basic Flap Closures**

On Friday, December 10 from 6:30 pm until 9:00 pm, faculty will present an optional workshop on the specialized suture techniques used in skin surgery, in addition to skin closure techniques and minor skin flaps that may improve the function and cosmetic appearance of vulvar skin closures. This workshop includes supervised hands-on practice on inanimate models. Techniques that are highlighted and practiced include the proper use and techniques of sutures, including vertical and horizontal mattress sutures, running cutaneous and deep buried sutures. Biopsy, closure, and tension reduction techniques will also be covered. Excision and closure techniques will be discussed including the ever-versatile fusiform excision, 0 to Z plastys, and single- and double-advancement flaps.

## ACCME Accreditation

The American Society for Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to provide continuing medical education for physicians.

## Continuing Medical Education Credits
