
The ASCCP Colposcopy Mentorship Program (CMP) is a three-tiered mentorship program designed to improve the beginning colposcopist's skills in understanding the disease process of the lower genital tract. The program's components are:

Tier 1: Attend ASCCP's Comprehensive Colposcopy Course.

Tier 2: Apply for the CMP Program. Once approved, perform 25 colposcopic examinations under the guidance of an experienced ASCCP-approved mentor.

Tier 3: Successful completion of the CMP exam.

Upon completion of the three tiers, the Mentee is awarded a certificate of program completion and may apply, if they choose, to serve as a mentor to others.




